

New Judge of Caribou Court

CARIBOU, Sept. 25—Donald C. O'Regan, who will succeed Joseph E. Hall as judge of the Caribou municipal court on the first of October, today received his appointment commission from the executive offices.

Mr. O'Regan, who has efficiently served the department of justice in a legal capacity and who is a graduate of Georgetown and empowered with the right to practice before the supreme court of the United States, is one of the most popular members of the Aroostook Bar and his appointment to this position of responsibility is a great source of pleasure to his numerous friends throughout Northern Maine.

Caribou municipal court has jurisdiction over one of the largest sections of any court in Maine.

The new judge received his early education in the public schools of this town and graduated from Caribou high school in 1919. He attended the University of Maine 1920-21 after which he entered Georgetown University, in Washington, D. C., graduating from the Law School in 1924. He was admitted to the Maine Bar and later passed the Bar examination and was admitted to practice in the District of Columbia.

He was appointed as special assistant to the attorney general of the United States, assigned to the admiralty law division of the shipping board and assisted Senator Bert M.
