

Donald O'Regan of Caribou Candidate For State Senate

Former Municipal Court Judge Seeking G. O. P. Nomination

CARIBOU, April 3.—Donald C. O'Regan, former judge of the Caribou municipal court and special assistant to the attorney general, United States Department of Justice, today announced his candidacy for the office of state senator on the Republican ticket.

Mr. O'Regan said: "After attending the Republican convention and talking with many delegates and leaders of the party, I am convinced that Maine will be represented more and more by young Republicans in public office, and Maine voters will endorse and vote for them in order to carry out the party policy as outlined in the 1938 precedent-shattering platform which was greatly influenced by the young Republicans. Furthermore, northern Aroostook should be represented in the Maine Senate."

Mr. O'Regan was educated in the public schools of this town, graduating from Caribou High school in 1918. During 1919-1921 he took a pre-legal course at the University of Maine, where he was a member of the Sigma Chi fraternity and Sophomore Oyls. He was graduated from Georgetown university law school in 1924 and was president and youngest member of his class. He was admitted to the practice of law before the courts of the District of Columbia and State of Maine and later admitted to practice before the United States supreme court.


While attending law school he was employed in the legal department of the U. S. Shipping Board for four years, assisted the late Col. R. C. Plummer, vice chairman, of Bath, in drafting the U. S.-German commercial treaty of 1924, and was appointed counsel to a sub-committee of the Senate commerce committee.

In 1925 he was appointed an attorney under Attorney General Nathan G. Stone, U. S. Department of Justice. He resigned in 1927 and until 1931 was engaged in private practice in Washington.

January 15, 1931, he opened a law office in Caribou and in October of that year became the youngest lawyer to be appointed judge of a municipal court in Maine. He is now engaged in private practice in Caribou.

He has served as president of the State of Maine society in Washington; president of the U. S. Marine Corps Officers Reserve association; chairman N. E. A. compliance board in Caribou, and has been active in civic matters and particularly in the development of the Caribou municipal airport. He has been a member of the National Press club and Racquet club in Washington for some years and is a member of the Matooksia club and Aroostook Valley Country club.
